A student with ADHD has many more distractions:

- people walking in and out of the classroom
- phone calls to the teacher
- a buzz from the heater
- other students passing notes
- decoding the question asked
- decoding the answer to the question
- the slight blinking of a light
- the tapping of someone's foot
- the buzz of a bug
- the way the jeans are tight on his legs...

Dealing with all these distractions in a typical classroom on a typical day while reading a book can be exhausting. According to the <u>CDC</u>, approximately 9.5% or 5.4 million children 4-17 years old have been diagnosed with ADHD, as of 2007 ("Attention deficit hyperactivity, 2010").

Today, teachers are pushing students to use computers and the Internet in their daily learning along with the learning styles of reading traditional texts. 85% of classrooms have at least one computer in its room for students to learn from (Coley). This is a great learning device, except for the extra distractions.

Internet sites now have

- blinking advertisements
- multiple text colors
- audio that starts playing once on the webpage
- and other non-relavent text and images surrounding the important information.

A typical student has enough trouble staying focused on what they are trying to read.
